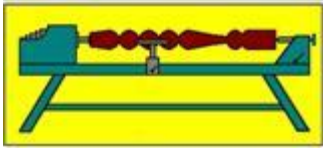

ELI AVISERA Master Classes and Demonstration 29-31 March 2017

Eli Avisera is an internationally renowned woodturner, based in Jerusalem, Israel. He will be visiting WSQ for three days during the week after Turnfest.

The program for Eli's visit to WSQ is:

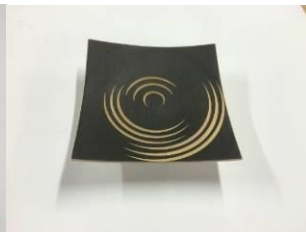
Wednesday 29 March, 9 am-4 pm: Master Class "Off-Centre Stick Figures"

Thursday 30 March, 9 am-4 pm: Master Class "Lidded container with off-centre spinning top lid"

Friday 31 March, 9 am-4 pm: One day demo, topics will include a square dish with off-centre ornamentation and a two-tiered earring stand (with earrings, time permitting).

The two Master Classes will each be limited to 10 active participants, and up to the same number of onlookers. Active participants in the Master Classes are encouraged to bring their own tools, and a limited number of WSQ tools will also be available; there are no special requirements. WSQ will be providing blanks of American Rock Maple for the Master Class projects for an additional fee, although participants may prefer to bring their own timber (dimensions to be advised). If the Master Classes are oversubscribed, members and non-members registering for both days may be asked to nominate their first preference.

The registration fees, set out in the attached registration form, include morning and afternoon teas and lunch. Registrations for non-members will open on Monday 13 February. Closing date for registrations is Friday 24 February. Please note that all registration forms must be accompanied by the appropriate payment, either by cash, cheque, credit card or direct bank transfer. Bookings without payment will not be accepted.

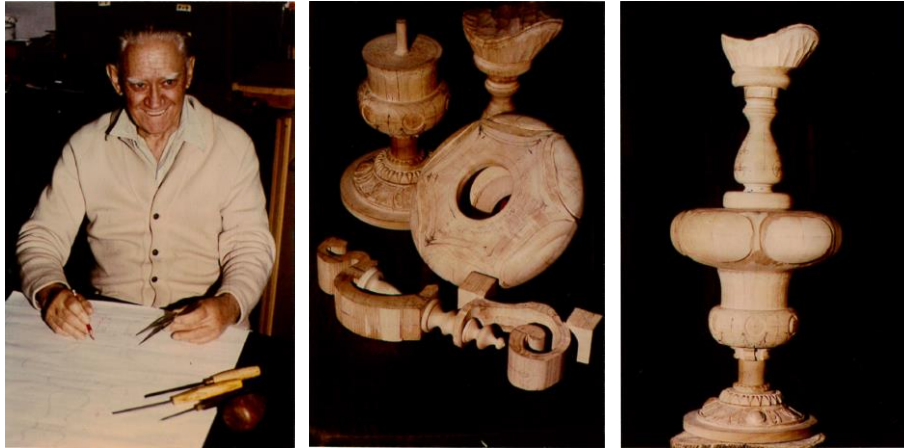

Ben Flack and his America's Cup Replica

Arthur "Ben" Flack was a Foundation member of WSQ (membership number 002), and the first meeting of the new society was held at Ben's home in Sunnybank in June 1979. Ben was editor of Turning Talk in 1985, and was one of the first three Life Members appointed in 1986 (Les Stennett and Joe Stick were the other two). Ben was a master of woodcarving as well as woodturning, and one of his crowning achievements was a full-size replica of the America's Cup. The project was inspired by Australia II winning the Cup from the New York Yacht Club in 1983. When the Cup was on display in Queensland in 1984, Ben took hundreds of photos, which he used to prepare line drawings and plans for replica.



Ben used Queensland beech wood for the project, which took approximately 800 hours to plan, turn, carve and finish. He displayed the finished replica at WSQ's Mt Coot-tha Exhibition in August 1985. Although valued at \$15,000, Ben said that the project had taken up too much of his life to be sold. Following Ben's death in 1996, aged 87, the cup was donated to the Royal Perth Yacht Club by Ben's daughters, Mavis and Noela.

While holidaying in Perth in December last year, I took the opportunity of visiting the RYPC to view the cup, and to find out more about it. I am grateful to Kelly Scott, Public Relations Officer at RYPC for welcoming me and for arranging for the Cup to be taken out of its locked glass cabinet so that I could photograph and hold it, and to John Readhead, RYPC Archivist, for providing the three photos above and other archival material. The photo on the left below is from the Courier Mail, which published an article about Ben and the America's Cup replica in October 1985 (reprinted in Turning Talk in November 1985).

Hats and Hatblocks

To make a hat the material has to be shaped over a mould and the material allowed to harden to take on the shape of the mould. The mould is called a hatblock. A hatblock can be made from all sorts of materials e.g. polystyrene, metal and compound materials, but they are most commonly made of timber.

The choice of timber is important. It must be stable, and maintain its shape through temperature and humidity variations. From the block maker's point of view, it must be a good timber to work with i.e. can be turned, carved, shaped and sanded, preferably light in weight, and nontoxic. From a milliner's point of view, it should be light weight, easy to insert pins into and remove them from, durable, maintain its shape, and not crack. During the blocking process steam can be used to shape the hat. In the past, all sorts of timbers have been used. Red cedar produces a red dust and is unpleasant to work with. Chipboards and similar materials are hard to work with, both to make and use – hard to shape and insert pins into. Also, the dust from the resins is undesirable to work with. The most common timber to use these days is Jelutong from Malaysia. It meets all the requirements.

A block is required for each hat design and each size. This is good news for the block maker. Hats come in all sorts of designs and sizes. The crown is normally worn sitting firmly on the head. Fascinators and hatinators are smaller headwear pieces that are attached to the head by a clip or elastic. Depending on the design, a brim may also be required. The crown is measured around the head at the forehead position. Heads are not round. They

are closest to oval in shape. This shape can also vary from person to person. Crown blocks usually match the brim with the crown size.

Not all blocks are round/oval. Round/oval blocks can have much of the shaping done on the wood lathe. Irregular shapes can be sculptured completely freehand, or at least the basic shape is cut out with a bandsaw.

Brim blocks are made so that the crown size matches the crown block. Brim blocks are often made larger so that the milliner can trim the brim to the desired size. Brim blocks can be made as double sided, depending on the design required and the thickness of the timber available. These blocks are a bit cheaper to make, and also save on storage space.

Add-ons for crown blocks can be cheaper to make and save on storage space.

Demonstration – Turning Hatblocks

On the morning of Saturday 28 January 15 members attended WSQ Hall to witness a demonstration about making hatblocks by Rob McGregor. Rob spent the first half of the session discussing how hats are made and about the hatblocks that are required. The article above is an edited version of his comments.

In the second half of the session Rob demonstrated how to make a basic hatblock on the lathe. He had prepared a blank consisting of 2 rounds of Jelutong timber about 200 mm in diameter glued together. He marked the centre point and 2 off-centre marks in a straight line, one either side of the centre. Rob attached a small faceplate using the centre point and mounted it on the lathe. He then used a bowl gouge to round the blank and shape the top of it to match a

template. He used a large straight scraper, at a steep angle, to refine the surface.



Rob then attached the small faceplate to one of the off-centre points. Rob repeated the shaping and refining process, with a bit more care, as is required with off-centre turning. The faceplate was relocated to the other off-centre point and the previous process was repeated. He relocated the faceplate to the centre point, and remounted the blank.



With the lathe off, Rob used an angle grinder with a Dremel cutter to perform the final shaping of the blank. He hand sanded the blank to its final state.

It was a very interesting demonstration. The members present expressed their appreciation of Rob's efforts, and, no doubt, left with a new appreciation of hats.

Tree of the Month

Blackbutt



Blackbutt Tree

Botanical name: *Eucalyptus pilularis* & *Eucalyptus andrewsii*.

Other common names: New England Blackbutt.

Distribution: A large hardwood which can grow to 60m (180ft) with diameters to 2m (6ft). Indigenous to Eastern Australia in a band from Southern New South Wales through to Southern Queensland in coastal forests.

Colour: Pale brown to brown, with a pinkish tinge when freshly cut. Very diverse range of colours.

The timber: Blackbutt is generally straight grained but occasionally will present wavy or interlocked grain. The texture is medium and even. Fine gum veins may sometimes be present.

Mechanical properties: Blackbutt has high crushing strength, is stiff and has a low steam bending classification. The timber is very durable. It is stable in service but can develop slight surface checking.

Working properties: Blackbutt is a very hard and strong timber of high density and can be moderately difficult to work with machine and hand tools. Tools

need to be kept in a sharp condition and cutter angles reduced especially on interlocked grain to prevent grain tearing. Blackbutt works to a medium to fine polish and takes glue, stain and finishes well. Pre drilling is advisable for nailing and screwing to avoid splitting.

Uses: The timber is used for flooring, furniture, bridge construction, mallet heads, cladding and turnery.

Availability: Plentiful.
